Get your surf on with the Kokatat Paddling Trunk constructed from tough and-static micro suede. A self-draining side pocket empties excess water and a longer inboard means you won't get bunched up inside your boat. \$45, kokatat.com 3. Whenever your seat expedition takes you, the rugged, back-up Merrell Gradient can get you there. The Vibram sticky rubber soles stick to reef or river rock, and the synthetic sands drain water so your digs are dry by campfire time. \$95, www.merrell.com 4. Get a big mellow? Check out the Predator Leo II, a baseball-style helmet for medium to extra-large domes. The Croc-Loc rear adjustment insures a snug fit, and the High Impact Revers Thermoplastic increases the stiffness—and your level of protection. \$100, predatorhelms.com 5. Stay snug, not sticky, with Joneses' Hilltop Heavyweight Baselayer made from 100 percent stretch-resistant wool.
